Noisy, sonambulant and downright weird – that's the endgame piece, performed for the first time in 1978 at the Royal Opera in Stockholm, by **György Ligeti** (1923-2006), dressed in a motley cloak beneath which mischief reigns. Belgian Michel de Ghelderode's play *La Balade du Grand Macabre*, a kind of absurd mystery play written in 1934, provided the composer and his librettist with the tragicomedy material for their opera. As a commentary on avant garde music in those days the Romanian born but since 1956 in exile living Hungarian called his work, tongue in cheek, an "Anti-Anti-Opera" – actually a return to opera in the traditional sense, but "dangerous, exaggerated, completely nuts and smutty". Inspired by pop art, layers of all kinds of borrowed bits of music, distorted quotes and dry-comic text combine to produce an over the top cocktail. The music's the driving force for a strange out of control world theatre, which contains possibly the best piss up in operatic history.

A grim reaper announces that the world will end at midnight. The clock's ticking. The impending catastrophe has put an end to the happy-go-lucky atmosphere in the imaginary principality. While two lovers want to end their lives having orgasms, the self-appointed prophet of doom Nekrotzar has roped in tipsy Piet the Pot and the astronomer Astradamors as helpers and goes to the palace, where the terrifying news has already reached the much loved prince and scheming ministers by way of the chief of the Gepopo, the secret police.

Conductor of this first ever performance in Frankfurt is the new General Music Director **Thomas Guggeis**, who started the season off with a New Production of *Le nozze di Figaro*. Director **Vasily Barkhatov**, who was born in Moscow, made his House Debut in 2022/23 with another Frankfurt First: Tchaikovsky's *The Sorceress*. Subsequent productions have included Weinberg's *The Idiot* at the Theater an der Wien and Verdi's *Simon Boccanegra* at the Deutsche Oper Berlin. Future plans include *Turandot* at the Teatro di San Carlo in Naples and *Eugene Onegin* at Theater Bonn. British baritone **Simon Neal** (Nekrotzar) is a regular guest at Oper Frankfurt, where roles have included the Forester *(Cunning Little Vixen)*, Kurwenal *(Tristan und Isolde)*, Achilles *(Penthesilea)*, Scarpia *(Tosca)*, Sebastiano *(Tiefland)* and the title role in Enescu's *Oedipe*. American countertenor **Eric Jurenas** (Prince Go-Go) appeared at Oper Frankfurt for the first time in 2018, as Natascha in Eötvös' *Tri Sestry*, returning in 2020/21 for Arsamene in Handel's *Xerxes*. British mezzo-soprano **Claire Barnett-Jones** (Mescalina) made her debut here in 2018/19, as Madame Flora in Menotti's *The Medium*. Nearly all the other roles are being sung by Members of Oper Frankfurt's Ensemble: **Peter Marsh** (Piet the Pot), **Anna Nekhames** (Venus / Chief of der Gepopo), **Alfred Reiter** (Astradamors), **Michael McCown** (White Minister), **Iain MacNeil** (Black Minister), **Elizabeth Reiter** (Amanda) and **Karolina Makuła** (Amando).
